LHSMA Announces Winners of the 2013 Abdel Ross Wentz Prizes

Abdel Ross Wentz was a leading figure in Lutheran American ism. From 1916-1956 he was professor of Church History and later President of Get-Theological tysburg Seminary. At the time of his death, an endowment was created which provides prize money for the best two historical papers North written on American Lutheranism produced by either first degree Lutheran seminarians or other graduate students at the PhD level. At the January board meeting, the recomof mendation the Wentz Prize Committee was received by the board and two prizes were awarded for 2013, both written by ELCA seminarians.

The winners are Kristofer Coffman from Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota, whose paper is entitled, "Lord, I Have Come into Your Holy House: A brief History of the Norwegian Liturgy in America;" and Victoria Larson, writing on "The Case of the Last American Lutheran in China: The American Lutheran Response to the Imprisonment of Paul Mackensen,

Recognition consists of a commemorative essay prepared by the Site Recognition Committee; appropriate images of the site added to the LHS-MA website; presentation of a plaque for mounting at the site itself; and a \$750 grant for preserving the site's historical records, or for disseminating knowledge of the site's history.

The Site-Recognition Program aims specifically to recognize sites where an event important in

LHSMA Awards the Biglerville Prize for 2014



Power, Politics, and the Missouri Synod: A Conflict that Changed American Christianity by Dr. James C. Burkee has won the St. Paul, Biglerville Prize for 2014. The prize is awarded every two or three years by the Society to a recently published book of mature scholarship in American Lutheran history. It was established by St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Biglerville to honor their pastor, The Rev. Frederick Weiser, at the time of his retirement. It includes a \$3000 award and was last awarded in 2011.

Burkee's book relates the individuals and events that led to the schism in the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod in the 1970's. A scholarly history of this period had not been written until Burkee, a member of LCMS, began to examine the period referred to as "Seminex" and to ask questions about what really happened in this period. He soon discovered that the wounds were still very deep and the topic relatively untouched. His splendid research includes interviews by the participants as well as church records and the recently available papers of J. A. O. (Jack) Preus, president of LCMS from 1969 to 1981. This is a sad tale of denominational conflict, but it is not

just denominational history. Rather it "is modern church history writ large. It is yet another tale of

epic struggle between the forces of modernism and conservatism in American religious life." (Power, 2) Burkee discovered that far from being a disagreement about theology or Biblical authority, as church officials had sought to portray it, the conflict was primarily di-



rected and exploited by the social and political views of its leaders, particularly Herman Otten and Jack Preus.

The research in the book is extensive, deep and most importantly, fair. As his research progressed, Burkee withheld judgment on the events of the church but finally emerged as a critic who rejects the tactics and arguments of the "winning" (conservative) side. The result is a book that is sad, instructive and revelatory. It is a fine example of what the Biglerville Prize seeks to honor.

2014 Fall Program to Explore German-American Lutheran Language Conflict

"Germans, don't mix with Remain Germans! others! You will remain so through language: Language unites you firmly; only love and honor it sincerely! No other language will replace yours. Only the mother tongue describes truly what the soul experiences, thinks, feels, and explores. Preserve it, a mirror of the people, then no external force will ever rob it, but will be repelled by the union of the people with the language." Ernst Ludwig Brauns, author of emigrant manual, 1829 (quoted in Friederike Baer, The Trial of Frederick Eberle, New York University Press, New York and London, 2008).

Seeking familiarity of culture and language, German-American immigrants typically clustered in ethnic neighborhoods or villages while transitioning to citizenship in their new land. Traditional Lutheran religious worship services conducted in the mother tongue helped to preserve German identity amid a predominantly English-speaking population. While many believed the right to language choice was guaranteed by American democratic principles, others, who envisioned an America united by one language, claimed the use of German by immigrants was unpatriotic and, in fact, created a "wall of partition between inhabitants of the same land." The battle between languages reflected the multilingual nature of the young country, but it became a point of passionate conflict within the German Lutheran community itself. LHSMA's fall program presenters will examine the language question in emerging eastern American Lutheran congregations and institutions.

LHSMA's Fall Program, Tradition or Context: German Lutheran Congregations Confront the Melting Pot, will convene on Saturday, October 4. 2014, from 9:30 AM - 3:30 PM in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania's port city where many German immigrants stepped onto American soil. The program will be held at Paul's Run Liberty Lutheran campus, 9896 Bustleton Avenue, and will include with a tour of Philadelphia Lutheran Seminary Archives, 7901 Germantown Pike.

Keynote speaker for the day will be Dr. Friederike
